#### CHC Placemakers - Design, Development & Regeneration Conference 2021

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Nothing has given a more acute sense of the place we live than the challenges presented by COVID-19. The importance of *Home* has been at the forefront of all of our minds over the last year, but our geographical boundaries and the public services and businesses that operate locally have also come to the fore.

The pandemic has served as a timely reminder that space, layout and connectivity all have a big bearing on our ability to adapt to changing circumstances, be that health or economic.

We have also seen the striking images of deserted town and city centres, and fundamental questions have been asked about how we interact with the places we live.

Placemaking is a word that we hear used often in housing, and one which means many things to many people. Fundamentally, it is focused on people,

to ensure that we deliver inclusive, socially connected and vibrant communities.

In 2020, the Design Commission for Wales and Welsh Government launched a *Placemaking Charter*, to strengthen the focus on placemaking in policy and practice in Wales. It aims to provide a common understanding of the range of considerations that go into placemaking, and as signatories to the Charter, CHC is committed to sharing this learning and embedding new approaches in the housing association sector.

This conference will explore what Placemaking means for housing associations, how it can be delivered in practice, and seek to gain inspiration from elsewhere. What have we learned over the last year, and how can we build places that people want to live in?

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<ul> <li>Patrick Williams, National Programme Manager, Active Travel Fund Sustrans Cymru @SustransCymru There is strong evidence that walking and cycling can play a very significant role in optimising the contribution of transport to economic performance by reducing congestion, supporting local businesses and high streets, direct job creation and supporting the leisure and tourism industry. </li> <li>With the UK population expected to increase by almost 10 million over the next 25 years, linking housing growth with walking, cycling and public transport will help ensure new developments are built in the right places and with the right infrastructure to enable efficient and sustainable mobility that is attractive for people and businesses. In this session we will hear from Sustrans about their Active Travel Tool Kit and how it can be used by the social housing sector and private builders to align housing growth with sustainable transport and how to better plan housing growth to enable and support sustainable transport infrastructure.</li></ul>

Jen played a key role in the development of the Placemaking Charter, and in this session, she will reflect on what the Charter means for housing associations and how it can be practically applied to the day-to-day work of delivering homes.

Her work has won many awards particularly for housing and community projects including RIBA awards for a homeless centre, a crisis centre, artists' studios and two housing projects in sensitive rural locations. 	In recent years, urban placemaking and regeneration schemes have come under increasing scrutiny from the media and communities with worries about gentrification and its impact growing. The real life challenges of affordability and dislocation for many communities aren't limited to any one city or country, and is a phenomenon that many countries are grappling with.
	In this session, we will hear perspectives from experts from across Europe with insight into design, sustainability and community engagement. Our speakers will consider how we can undertake the renewal and regeneration of places in a way that engages with communities and delivers sustainable outcomes.
	Bahanur Nasya, Project Manager, Eutropian @Eutropian Bahanur Nasya is a Viennese architect and film producer. She has assisted in the publication of the "manual for emerging architects" and she was the co-editor of the recent wonderland publication "represent & reflect". Currently, she is involved in international research projects, is the chairwoman of the association "xsentrikarts" and is the Head of Organisations at Wonderland. In projects she is aiming to increase future proofness, diversity and self-determination, while paying attention to common uses and rights.
